On Easter Monday the residents of Haux, France crack more than 4,500 eggs into a gigantic pan to create a massive Easter Omelette that serves over 1,000 people



LETTER FROM DICOESAN PASTORAL COUNCIL

This is always where Jesus asks his followers to go; into the deep, the dark, the unknown. It can feel uncomfortable to leave behind what is familiar and step out in faith, and yet, this is where we find abundance! Peter found what he needed to allow him to leave his old life and follow Jesus. We will find what we need to secure the future of the Church in our Diocese. We can put out into deep water with the words Jesus spoke to Peter ringing in our own ears - "follow me and I will make you fishers of men and women."

Bishop Denis and the Diocesan Pastoral Council are inviting all priests and three lay people from each of our parishes to gather for an evening of prayer, listening and discernment to help us to discover the next steps on our journey together as Church.

Each parish will gather with neighbouring parishes in what we are calling Pastoral Areas, Building relationships with those around us will be vital if we are to move into the future with strength. In recent years Pope Francis has brought the synodal nature of the Church to the fore. The preparatory document for the upcoming Synod on Synodality reminds us that 'A synodal Church, in announcing the Gospel, "journeys together."¹ In the diocese of Kildare and Leighlin, this is our time to live this message. We want to pray and listen together as a faith community so that we can find the way forward for a living faith in our diocese for many generations to come The reality we face is a stark one; stark but not hopeless or forlorn. We do not have the numbers of either clergy or lay faithful that allowed for us to build the structures we now have. We have grown up in a Church marked by lots of clergy and lots of people going to Mass, giving rise to lots of parishes and lots of buildings. The Church in the future - indeed the Church of today - will no longer be marked by such things. We see this and know that now is the time to act. In the last words of the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus tells us; "know that I will be with you, even to the end of time"². While the reality we are facing may be stark, these words give us hope. We are to put out into deep water, knowing that Jesus is with us. Pope Francis tells us; "We must fan the flame of hope that has been given us... looking to the future with an open spirit, a trusting heart and a far-sighted vision."³ We are to be God's dreamers for the time that we are in. And, as with all dreams, there is no limit to what we might consider achieving. The season of Easter reminds us that even as we live in times of change and uncertainty, we have the light of Christ to lead us, guide us and overcome all darkness and fear. As a community of believers, we will find a path forward together. In every generation faithful Christians are called to live and share their faith, so that future generations will also know the joy of the Gospel. Where is the Holy Spirit calling us to go and grow in this generation? The Pastoral Area meetings are an important step for our diocese in journeying together as we pray, share and listen together to discover the call of the Holy Spirit for these times. This putting out into the deep together, as a Synodal Church, "will involve a process of humbly learning together how God is calling us to be as the Church in the third millennium
